Letter from The Editor


Hello Sorors!

On Saturday, March 9, 2019, Alpha Sigma joined Sigma Gamma Rho chapters nationwide in hosting the annual Youth Symposium. Under this year's theme "Mission Possible: A Safe Space for Our Youth", we discussed human trafficking and how youth, parents, and guardians can protect themselves and others from becoming victims.

Soror Jennifer Love led our opening prayer and Tamika Smith facilitated our icebreaker teambuilding activity. Sorors Sher'ron Anderson, Jocenelle Alcimé and Rishawnda Archie hosted the photo booth area. Soror Daphne Gilmore led the registration and food distribution teams with the support of Sorors Charlene Williams, Tammy Bowman, Alexis Holland and Kathy Jones. Special thanks to Sorors DeShara Doub and Megan Thomas who assisted with greeting guests and overall event support.

There were 3 presentations given, one session focused on defining Human Trafficking to our youth attendees and included a video highlighting recent cases of trafficking. At the same time, there was a session given to parents and guardians on how to be more aware of signs of human trafficking.

The group came back together for a presentation titled "Finding Yourself vs. Losing Yourself" to discuss self-esteem and things around you that can affect self-image and self-esteem. During this presentation, attendees were asked to comment on photos and share others things that can heavily influence self-esteem in today's world.

We had 81 attendees total at the event. This includes 41 youth, 28 sorors and 12 guests. For their first event on February 28th, the Health and Wellness Committee invited four black mental health professionals to speak on a panel about their career and experiences within their respective fields. Panelists included: Soror ElWanda Haynes LCSW, George Middleton (Mental Health Counselor), Soror Ti'auna Williams (LMHC), and Dwight Holland (therapist and minister).

Facilitated by committee chair Alicia Seawood, topics ranged from self-care to inequality in our educational systems. The panelists were able to give a wide range of perspectives, with the common lense of a black individual. TEACH+PLUS EDUCATORS PANEL



On Saturday, April 13, Sorors gathered with representatives from Butler University College of Education and Teach Plus Policy Fellows of Indiana. The event was focused on dialogue, learning, and connection with local educators. It was a great opportunity to engage with community partners, better understand the education requirements of local teacher and the challenges that they face in addition to managing their classrooms. Educator sorors were present and provided insight on their experiences and responses to state of local education.



Our panel members were Dr. Susan Adams, associate professor of Middle/Secondary Education at Butler University, Soror Marier Cox, a reading interventionist at Greenbriar Elementary School and 2018-19 Teach Plus Indiana Teaching Policy Fellow, Rachel Hathaway, Interim Executive Director at Teach Plus of Indiana, and John Riley, a math and physics teacher at Shortridge International Baccalaureate (IB) High School and 2018-19 Teach Plus Indiana Teaching Policy Fellow.



Dr. Susan Adams provided a great overview on how Butler University's College of Education degree programs prepare future educators, as well as education training requirements with the College and the State of Indiana. Adams spoke very frankly about issues challenging local teachers and the environments in which they teach.

Soror Marier Cox provided an overview of the mission of the Teach Plus program and advised on events and efforts that sorors can start to support and be more present in conversations that affect our teachers, students and local schools.

Special thank you to Soror Cox, Life Member #351, for bring your vision to this officer to share with the chapter. This event was a refreshing opportunity to reflect on state of education in Indiana in honor of our Founders who fought for the right to teach our communities almost 100 years ago. It is our legacy within Alpha Sigma to do our best to support local educators and school to the best our ability. It is my hope that we continue this type of discussion and tradition of taking on an advocate role for our educators and schools.
